

The General Intellectual Humility Scale in Argentina: Adaptation and Validation

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This study presents the adaptation and validation of the General Intellectual Humility Scale (GIHS) for Argentina, addressing the scarcity of Spanish-language instruments measuring this epistemic virtue. A sample of 201 Argentinian adults ($M = 58.9$, $SD = 16.6$; 70.6% female) completed the adapted GIHS, the Mini-IPIP, and demographic questions through an online survey. The adaptation followed International Test Commission guidelines. Confirmatory factor analysis supported the unidimensional structure with adequate fit ($CFI = 0.953$, $TLI = 0.922$, $RMSEA = 0.087$). Internal consistency was good ($\alpha = 0.797$, $\omega = 0.801$). External convergent validity was demonstrated through significant correlation with agreeableness ($r = 0.341$, $p < .001$), consistent with theoretical expectations. The Argentinian GIHS is a psychometrically sound instrument suitable for assessing intellectual humility in the Argentinian population, enabling cross-cultural research on this virtue crucial for constructive dialogue in polarized societies.

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
